AWARD RECIPIENTS - BIOGRAPHIES



Bryant Keith AlexanderDean, College of Communication and Fine Arts, LMU

Bryant Keith Alexander, Ph.D., is the fourth boy of five boys, the fifth child of seven children born to Velma Ray Bell-Alexander and Joseph Junius Alexander Sr. of Lafayette, Louisiana. Currently, he is Dean of the LMU College of Communication and Fine Arts and professor of Communication, Performance and Cultural Studies. Dean Alexander is an active scholar with a distinguished record of teaching, service, professional activity, and a regular performer and keynote speaker at universities and conferences around the

country.

His nearly 200 scholarly publications appear in leading journals, edited volumes, and major handbooks that evidence the broad interdisciplinary and intellectual curiosity of his engagement. Dean Alexander has seven books. His scholarship and teaching have been recognized with a range of national and regional awards.

Dean Alexander has an earned Ph.D. from Southern Illinois University Carbondale. He holds a bachelor's and master's degree from what is now the University of Louisiana, Lafayette. At LMU, he holds tenure in the Department of Communication Studies and proudly serves as Affiliate Faculty in the Educational Leadership for Social Justice Doctoral Program in LMU's School of Education.

Before arriving at LMU, Dean Alexander was a Professor of Communication Studies and Affiliate Faculty of Theatre Arts and Dance at California State University Los Angeles, where he also served as the Director of Graduate Teaching Associates in the Department of Communication Studies, chair of the Department of Liberal Studies, Associate Dean, and Interim Dean of the College of Arts and Letters — a college that included many of the current disciplines in CFA as well as English, Liberal Studies, Modern Languages and Literatures, Philosophy, Television, Film and Media Studies, with master's and MFA degrees in film and art, along with course offerings, minor programs, and certificates in Journalism, Korean, Linguistics, Teaching Critical Thinking, as well as Women, Genders and Sexualities.

Dean Alexander has evidenced the ability to work successfully in diverse academic institutions, including the California State University Los Angeles, Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Moorhead State University, MN and Texas A&M University-College Station, TX which informs his leadership at LMU.

Dean Alexander's administrative, teaching, and scholarly life celebrates integrative and interdisciplinary approaches to knowledge, and a demonstrated commitment to high-quality undergraduate and graduate programs. He has commitments in promoting leadership in/as collaboration and consensus building as well as an acknowledgment of administration, teaching, and scholarship as informing practices of active academic professionalism. He promotes and embodies the importance of diversity, equity, and inclusion in all aspects of higher education and civic life.



Joanna Carroll, CSJ Campus Minister Emerita, Spiritual Director, Chaplain Emerita for Marians Service Organization, LMU

Sr. Joanna Carroll, CSJ grew up in Compton, California with her five siblings in a close-knit family. Her parents and teachers raised her in the Catholic faith, and she was taught by Sisters of St. Joseph all her life. Sr. Joanna earned a bachelor's in Child Development from Mount St. Mary's College in Los Angeles and then joined the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange and began her long career in education and ministry. She continued her studies

at St. Louis University and Chicago Loyola University, earning a certification in Religious Formation and a master's degree in Pastoral Studies.

Sr. Joanna taught in Catholic elementary schools in Southern and Northern California for twenty-one years, and she served as religion and sacramental program coordinator, vice-principal, liturgy and retreat director, and music minister. She has served as Vocation Director for her congregation. Sr. Joanna served as a Campus Minister in the Spiritual Direction Office for students at Loyola Marymount University for twenty years. After her cancer diagnosis and surgery, she decided to retire from LMU. Currently, she is happy as a volunteer, serving as a spiritual director and companion, whenever possible, as well as offering the ministry of presence on campus.

Sr. Joanna enjoys music and the arts, meditation, nature and animals, and spending time with her religious community, her family and friends, young adults, co-ministers, and co-workers. She has loved her time with students, parents, priests, sisters, faculty, and staff at LMU, and she is so grateful for having had this opportunity to be immersed in Ignatian spirituality. A native Angelino, Cristina Cuellar has over 18-years of experience in youth development and program management, currently serving as the Executive Director of Operation Progress LA and formerly as VP of Programming for Verbum Dei High School's Corporate Work Study Program. She is an alum of Loyola Marymount University and has a master's degree in Catholic School Administration and a bachelor's in Spanish with a minor in Communication Studies.

In the summer of 2021, Cristina joined the Operation Progress LA team to lead the organization in a strategic plan for continued growth and sustainability. Her vision is to increase the impact of students served by the organization annually through a myriad of services catered to individual student needs, specifically in academic case management, socioemotional wellbeing, and executive skill function development.

Prior to Operation Progress, Cristina led the Corporate Work Study Program at Verbum Dei to increase student work attendance from 87% to an average 98% beginning in 2006; improve performance at work placements to an average 97% of students meeting expectations of the job position consistently for 15 years; annually re-vamp on-boarding programs to improve student and supervisor preparation; and maintain a consistent 97% positive customer service satisfaction rate with the program's corporate partners. Her responsibilities included the day-to-day administration, which included 350+ student placements, training, coaching and student-centered development, corporate partner relationship management, academic and work study liaison with the high school's principal's team, Department of Labor compliance, safety in the workplace, and transportation management of students to-and-from work. From 2006 to 2010, Cristina taught a senior year elective, Studio Art: An Analysis of the Elements of Art and Design, focused on building students' self-confidence in their artistic abilities and expressions through an appreciation for art. Over the years, she served as a Spanish translator in various forms – simultaneous, one-on-one parent meetings and in written format. Before embarking on her journey with Verbum Dei, she was a student worker at Loyola Marymount University's Center for Service and Action.

Cristina is Vice Chair of Notre Dame Schools Los Angeles and serves on the boards of St. Lawrence Brindisi Catholic School. After several years of leading a Girl Scout troop in the inner city, she turned to mentoring new troop leaders for three years. When not enjoying the outdoors or the occasional binge-worthy show, Cristina is enjoying the company of family and friends.



Erika L. Cuellar Co-Founder, Alma Backyard Farms

Erika Cuellar was born and raised in Los Angeles as a first-generation Mexican American. She grew up in South Central/Watts, where she witnessed how her community was fraught with challenges in education, food insecurity, and limited safe green spaces. Undeterred, Erika pursued a degree in Education/Liberal Studies at Loyola Marymount University. She applied her studies to empower previously incarcerated women at Homeqirl Cafe, a division of Homeboy Industries. She used the kitchen/restaurant as

her informal classroom to create a space where women regained love for themselves, trust in each other and care for their surroundings. Erika's time at Homegirl Cafe led her to explore the deeper, reciprocal relationship between people, plants and place. ALMA Backyard Farms (ALMA) was born out of this. Today, ALMA helps communities move from scarcity to abundance. An abundance of food, opportunity, and hope. She is grateful to partake in work that connects people to food, to each other and to our land.



Luis De La O Custodian, Facilities Management, LMU

Luis De La O was born in the city of Juárez in the state of Chihuahua, México in 1949. At the age of 16, he was brought to the United States along with his five siblings. Immigrating to the US was not a positive experience, Luis experienced lots of discrimination, including discrimination between Latinos – Latinos born in the US versus Latinos born in México. Faced with the challenges of a new country and a new language, Luis began to work instead of attending school. Throughout the years he learned various

jobs, including jewelry making, gardening, and custodial work. At first, Luis didn't have an absolute need to learn English because he spent much of his time working with other Latinos.

Eventually, Luis found himself working at a factory for a French bread-making company where he worked for 15 years. Influenced greatly by the work of labor rights activist, César Chávez, Luis kept a watchful eye over the way he and his fellow workers were treated and brought attention to labor violations. Soon after the company eliminated medical benefits to reduce costs, Luis helped mobilize workers to organize a strike. For years, Luis faced intimidation and pressure to leave the company. After suffering an injury at work, Luis took an extended leave of absence, but upon attempting to return, he was told that he no longer had a position with the company.

In 1997, Luis seized the opportunity to work at LMU. It's at LMU where Luis truly began to learn English, and he's eager to continue mastering the language. It's also at LMU where he began receiving full working benefits such as medical, dental, vision, and life insurance. However, after more than 24 years at LMU, Luis is still greatly influenced by César Chávez and plans to postpone retirement until students, staff, and faculty at LMU successfully advocate for custodial staff to finally earn a minimum livable wage of \$21 dollars per hour.

Luis has a wonderful wife and three beautiful children who continue to motivate his advocacy.

Doris Baizley (Script Editor and Writer) teaches in the LMU Department of Theatre Arts. Her published plays MRS. CALIFORNIA, SHILOH RULES, and A CHRISTMAS CAROL were developed and premiered at the Mark Taper Forum, ACT Seattle, and the Alabama Shakespeare Festival. Her documentary and community-based plays include SISTERS OF PEACE, about four activist CSJ Sisters, ONE DAY SARAH HOUSE: LIVING AND DREAMING IN HOSPICE, winner of the Santa Barbara Independent Award for best original script; PH*REAKS: THE HIDDEN HISTORY OF PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES (co-written with Victoria Ann Lewis); and SEX STING, based on an FBI internet case, listed as one of the LA Weekly's 10 best original plays in

2013. As story editor for documentary films, she has worked with Anne Makepeace on "We Still Live Here! As Nutayanean" and Tribal Justice winner of the American Indian Film Festival documentary award, both seen on the PBS series POV. Doris continues to work with Judith Royer CSJ on dramatized narrative projects, most recently SPIRIT MOVES: The Life and Work of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange.



Bonnie Banfield (Writer) is a Playwright, Actor and founding member of LA Theatre Works. *The Circle*, a video presentation she worked on with Theatre Workers Project during the pandemic, was chosen as an official selection for the Monologues and Poetry International Film Fest 2020. A lyrical blend of spoken word and movement, written by men from California State Prison, Los Angeles County's Progressive Programming Facility, and performed by formerly incarcerated artists, *The Circle* was also presented as part of the inaugural Baltimore Micro Film Fest, and screened as part of the Opening Night of the Social Justice Film Festival in Seattle. Returning to Hidden Heroes for another season is a major highlight of her year.



Catharine Dada (Actor) received her Ph.D. in Religious Studies from the University of Kent, Canterbury, UK. The focus of her research was on modern experiences of spirituality in Western Theatre. She received her first degree in Theatre from LMU and subsequently trained as a classical actress at the Bristol Old Vic Theatre School in England. Catharine has acted in several productions for the Royal Shakespeare Company - performing at theaters at Stratford and at the Barbican in London, as well as playing leading roles in many repertory theaters throughout the UK.

She was Artistic Director of the Sacred Performance Project - her company's work has been seen at festivals at Pari in Italy, and at Canterbury and Oxford in the UK. MaryAnne Huepper, CSJ (Award Presenter) is Associate Director at LMU's CSJ Center for Reconciliation and Justice and a member of the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange. She has served in the field of education in diverse roles: as an elementary teacher, principal, high school teacher, college administrator, adjunct instructor for Marymount College and the University of San Francisco. MaryAnne served the Diocese of Orange as an instructor for the Pastoral Ministry Institute and the Deaconate Program and as a member of the Commission for Ecumenical and Interfaith Affairs. Before coming to LMU she was Director of the Center for Spiritual Development in Orange. MaryAnne also served at St. Joseph Health (now Providence St. Joseph

Health), as a trustee in two hospitals and as a board member of a hospital foundation. MaryAnne continues to provide presentations for programs of ministry formation namely, the Art of Spiritual Direction (CSD) program. She serves currently on the LMU Board of Trustees.
