Her work on Polish and American Jewish writers appears in book chapters and other publications. She regularly reviews books for Holocaust and Genocide Studies, Journal of the American Academy of Religion, and American Jewish History. In 2011, Dr. Levitsky held a Schusterman Fellowship at the Summer Institute for Israel Studies at Brandeis University.
