**Stacy Barnes** 

Senior Director of Development, School of Film and Television, LMU

Stacy Barnes is the Senior Director of Development for both The School of Film and Television and The College of Communication and Fine Arts. She raises major gifts, directs alumni programming and creates partnerships for LMU with LA institutions as diverse as Film Independent and Big Brothers Big Sisters of Los Angeles. Prior to her

fundraising career, she held positions in the entertainment industry at Quincy Jones Productions, Warner Bros. and Warner Music Group.

Stacy began fundraising for the arts in Washington DC. While there, she was with the Atlas Performing Arts Center. She has held key leadership roles with The Theatre @ Boston Court, The UCLA School of Film and Television, The UCLA Film & Television Archive and LA Stage Alliance. She currently sits on the Board of 24<sup>th</sup> Street Theatre, an arts organization like no other, unique in creating award-winning theatre for young audiences that is sophisticated enough for adults.

In her spare time, Stacy is an amateur singer, photographer and pet rescuer. She's an avid hiker and enjoys hitting the trails with her dogs, though that generally entails carrying one or both of them.



**Teresa Groth, DMJ**Executive Director, The Francisco Homes

Teresa Groth, DMJ, is dedicated to the personal transformation of individuals returning from long-term incarceration and to their role in the healing of our community. As Executive Director of The Francisco Homes (TFH) - a transitional housing program located in South Los Angeles with a robust program of support groups, workshops and case management - she communicates with almost 4,000 incarcerated individuals and has

welcomed more than 500 men with a hug and a home placement over the past ten years.

Sister Teresa is a member of the Daughters of Mary and Joseph, a community of Catholic women committed to serving with mercy, compassion and hospitality. She lives in Los Angeles County in an international community of sisters who are dedicated to the education of the whole person. A number of the sisters also volunteer at TFH providing special skills and personal support to the residents.

Sister Teresa sees the approach of the homes as faith-inspired reaching out to people of all faiths. She accepts people where they are and works with them to achieve their goals. Her vision is a society where no person is shut out or kept from making a positive contribution; where hope, reconciliation and healing are nourished.



**Anna Harrison, Ph.D.**Associate Professor, Theological Studies, LMU

Anna Harrison is Associate Professor in the Department of Theological Studies where she teaches classes in the history of medieval western Christian thought and practice and writes on twelfth and thirteenth century monasticism. She earned her doctorate degree in religion from Columbia University. Anna is known by many to be deeply attuned to the call of service in all its forms, especially on behalf of contingent faculty and

non-exempt staff. She is an advocate for fair compensation and representation, a mentor and champion for junior scholars, and a confidante for the most vulnerable in our community. Her colleagues state that "she is mindless of personal interest or reputation in the fight for others...there is a kind of wholeness in her commitment...her dedication is indeed hidden: she does not call attention to it... Anna Harrison is indeed my personal hero." Anna embodies the mission of this institution tirelessly and unequivocally by leading a life of sincere compassion and justice.



# **Mimi Hoang, Ph.D.**Staff Psychologist, Student Psychological Services, LMU

Mimi Hoang is a nationally-recognized psychologist, educator, author, and grassroots activist specializing in the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, intersex, and asexual (LGBTQ+) and Asian Pacific Islander (API) communities. Since the 1990s, she has co-founded three organizations in Los Angeles for bisexual, pansexual, fluid, and other nonmonosexual (AKA "bi+") individuals, authored multiple publications, and earned a

seat at the landmark 2013 White House Bisexual Community Roundtable. Dr. Mimi's steadfast leadership has earned her multiple awards, mentions in *Cosmopolitan* and *HuffPost*, and being named "One of the Most Significant Women in the Bisexual Movement." She currently works as a Staff Psychologist at Loyola Marymount University (LMU) Student Psychological Services, Professor of Clinical Psychology at Antioch University Los Angeles, and as a consultant/trainer on diversity issues.

Dr. Mimi has worked primarily in community mental health and university counseling center settings due to her passion to serve the young and underserved. Her diverse clinical experience includes API immigrants and refugees, high risk and homeless teens, Native American foster youth, and first generation college students. Outside the office, Dr. Mimi's LGBTQ+ community leadership spans over two decades, including co-founding the Los Angeles Bi Task Force, amBi (LA's Bisexual Social Community) and Fluid at UCLA. She rallied the first bi+ contingent at the LA Pride Parade in 2008, pounded pavement for California's "No on 8" campaign for marriage equality in 2009, and has been documented in queer historical exhibits. She also served as a Board Member of the South Bay LGBT Center, a member of the state-wide #Out4MentalHealth Project and has led, advised, or volunteered with numerous API organizations, including API Equality - LA, AQWA (Asian/Pacific Islander Queer Women/Transgender Activists), and 'Ohana House/Asian Pacific Islanders for Human Rights.

Dr. Mimi has provided clinical supervision to therapists in training for over 10 years and has been an instructor at the high school, undergraduate, and graduate levels, as well as an instructor for continuing education courses for working professionals in medicine, mental health, higher education and K-12. She founded and directed the Safe Zone program at Cal State LA from 2009-2011 and launched a one-of-a-kind "Bi on Life" self-empowerment series in 2018. Dr. Mimi received her B.A. in Psychology with a Minor in Women's Studies from the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), M.A. in Clinical Psychology, AlU, Los Angeles and San Diego and Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology, Alliant International University (AIU), Los Angeles.



# The North Family (Chris, '85, Julianne, '88 and Katie '17), LMU De Colores Founding Members, Founders and Directors of Build a Miracle

The North Family are all proud LMU alumni. Chris and Julianne founded the program De Colores during their time at LMU and then founded the nonprofit Build a Miracle (BAM) after graduating in 1999. BAM - a home building, educational and community develop-

ment organization - has completed 380 homes for families previously living in shacks, has 23 college graduates and is currently providing over 100 students with college or high school scholarships. BAM also operates a Community Center in Tijuana serving 1,800 kids and adults each week offering educational, athletic and vocational opportunities.

After LMU, Chris attended UCLA's Anderson School (MBA '89) and has founded and managed companies in Mexico in the Aerospace and Ironworking industries. Julianne taught elementary school as a classroom and science teacher in Los Angeles and Dana Point before focusing on raising their four children and pouring an enormous amount of energy and love into Build a Miracle. Katie, who has been building homes in Tijuana, Mexico since she was four-years-old, studied Spanish at LMU, was a De Colores leader and the Marion Award winner. She went on to complete her master's degree in Nursing at the University of San Diego in 2019 and works as an RN on the Trauma Unit at Sharp Memorial Hospital.

What began the day Chris and Julianne met in 1985 at the flagpole on the day of their first De Colores trip to Mexico, morphed into Build a Miracle and has woven together into an amazing family adventure including Katie and her three siblings - Ryan, Kerryanne and Matthew.

Jami Brandli's (Writer) plays include Technicolor Life, S.O.E., M-Theory, ¡SOLDADERA!, Sisters Three, Through the Eye of a Needle, Medusa's Song, O: A Rhapsody in Divorce, and BLISS (or Emily Post is Dead!) which was named in the 2014 Kilroys List. Her work has been produced/developed at New Dramatists, New York Theatre Workshop, Launch Pad, The Women's Voices Theater Festival, Chalk REP, Great Plains Theatre Conference, The Lark, among other venues. She is a winner of John Gassner Memorial Playwriting Award, Holland New Voices Award, Ashland New Plays Festival and Aurora Theatre Company's GAP Prize; finalist for the 2016 PEN Literary Award for Drama, Playwrights' Center Core Writer Fellowship, Princess Grace Award, the O'Neill National Playwrights Conference, and nominated for the Susan Smith Blackburn Award. Technicolor Life premiered as part of the 2015 Women's Voices Theater Festival and received its Australian premiere in 2017. In 2018, BLISS (or Emily Post is Dead!) received a joint-world premiere with Moxie Theatre (San Diego) and Promethean Theatre (Chicago), ending with Moving Arts' production at Atwater Village Theatre in Los Angeles (LA Times Critic's Choice and Ovation Recommended). BLISS will receive its next production at Defunkt Theatre (Portland, OR) in early 2020. Through the Eye of a Needle (Stage Raw 'TOP TEN' Pick and Ovation Recommended) received its world premiere at The Road Theatre (Los Angeles), March-May 2018. Sisters Three received its world premiere with The Inkwell Theater (Los Angeles) in December through January 2019. As 2019 Humanitas Prize PLAY LA playwright, Jami was commissioned to write her latest play, Visiting Hours. She is currently a member of the 2019/2020 Under Construction playwright cohort at The Road Theatre. Jami teaches dramatic writing at Lesley University's low-residency MFA program.
