AWARD RECIPIENTS



GARY CRAIG is clinical professor of law and teaches civil litigation practice and courses in legal research and writing, ethical lawyering, and professional responsibility in the United States. Since joining the law school faculty in 2010, Gary has served in numerous leadership roles, including as associate dean for faculty from 2020-2023 and director of concentration programs from 2013-2020. Gary also has directed Loyola's Summer Institute Program and served as a faculty advisor for the Civil Litigation and Advocacy Concentration and the Young Lawyers Program. In 2013, 2015, and 2019, Gary received the Excellence in Teaching Award from the graduating class. In 2016, he received the David P. Leonard Memorial Faculty Service Award.

Prior to joining the Loyola faculty, Gary was a partner in the Los Angeles office of Sidley Austin LLP, where he practiced in all areas of litigation, with an emphasis on representing

accounting firms and corporations in connection with securities fraud, professional liability, negligence, and breach of contract litigation. Gary also represented clients in connection with investigations conducted by the United States Department of Justice and the United States Securities and Exchange Commission's Division of Enforcement. He handled various pro bono matters, including the successful representation of clients seeking asylum in the United States, and he established an educational partnership between Sidley's Los Angeles office and Dorsey High School's Law Magnet Program. Through this partnership, Sidley facilitated numerous programs designed to augment the Law Magnet's curriculum with hands-on workshops and field trips that introduced the students to the wide variety of careers within the legal community. Gary is a graduate of Stanford Law School and Occidental College.



JAMAL EPPERSON (they/them) joined the LMU community in 2019 and joined the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) team in 2022. As the assistant director of DEI initiatives, Jamal works with various initiatives throughout DEI, such as implicit bias and the LMU Antiracism Workshop Series. In addition, Jamal serves as a liaison between the office for Human Resources and DEI by assisting with equitable recruitment and hiring practices for faculty and staff. Before this role, Jamal worked in various capacities in the Student Housing office and Student Affairs division, where they learned to center their work from a feminist abolitionist framework by promoting radical love. Jamal is currently a doctoral student at the University of San Francisco (USF) studying international multicultural education with a concentration in human rights education and a minor in organization and leadership.

Prior to their studies at USF, they received their M.Ed. in student affairs in higher education from Marquette University and a B.A. from Western Michigan University in music and psychology. Outside of work, Jamal volunteers at Centinela Youth Services as a restorative justice facilitator, is a Capricorn sun, rising Scorpio, and Aries moon, and enjoys writing music, playing video games, traveling, thrift shopping, and annoying their dog Nico.



DIANE GASPER is the director of faith formation for St. Monica Catholic Community, a recent transition from her position as program coordinator for faculty services in the LMU School of Education. A proud lion from the class of 1991, Diane earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in psychology. When one of her LMU mentors asked if she had considered working in Catholic schools, she realized that she could have a career doing the things she was most passionate about: teaching about faith, planning retreats, and sharing spiritual experiences with others. Diane began teaching religion and working in campus ministry at Bishop Alemany High School where, for 10 years, she sought to enrich the faith lives of young people.

In 1999 she married her love, Thom Gasper (M.A. '02, Ed.D. '22) who she met while both were serving at different Catholic high schools. Diane is happiest when they spend time

SCHOENE MAHMOOD brings 17 years of experience with restorative justice practices implementation to Loyola Marymount University. In her role as the program manager of the LMU Center for Urban Resilience (CURes) Restorative Justice Project, Schoene oversees a multifaceted initiative dedicated to empowering individuals and communities through transformative restorative justice methods. Her responsibilities encompass providing the facilitation of restorative conferences, trainings, and skill-building workshops. Notably, the Restorative Justice Project achieved a significant milestone by securing a prestigious grant to establish the Southern California Restorative Justice Consortium to cultivate restorative justice leaders for scholarship, practice, and implementation, offering a regional model that can be replicated nationwide.

Before her tenure with CURes, Schoene facilitated community conferences for over 400 juvenile expulsion, arrest, and court-diversion cases referred by the Maryland State Attorney Office, the Department of Juvenile Services, and the Baltimore City Police Department, while working at the Community Conferencing Center (now called Restorative Response Baltimore). Since her relocation to Los Angeles in 2011, Schoene has facilitated over 300 restorative conferences.



MARIA ELENA PERALES works for the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange as director of the St. Joseph Justice Center. She has been with the congregation for over 17 years. Her ministry engages religious congregations, community, and faith leaders at local and national levels in the areas of social and ecological justice. She always tries to find ways to collaborate with others to address the needs of the most vulnerable among us. She finds it an honor to work for and with the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange in their mission to strive to be mindful of the diverse and unmet needs of the "dear neighbor".

Maria Elena is a proud mother to two young adults, Stephanie and Michael. She is a first-generation immigrant who was among the first to graduate from college in her family. She graduated from Mount St. Mary's University with a bachelor's degree in social work. She enjoys spending time with family, loves the outdoors, and looks forward to

opportunities to read and listen to podcasts in her spare time.



DORIS BAIZLEY (Script Editor) is a Los Angeles playwright and founding member of LA Theater Works. Her plays have been developed and produced by US regional theaters including The Mark Taper Forum, The Alley Theater, ACT Seattle, Alabama Shakespeare Festival, The National Theatre of the Deaf, History Theatre St. Paul, and the Guthrie Theatre/ Playwrights Center. She has been resident playwright for the Taper's ITP company for young audiences and dramaturg for its Other Voices program for theater artists with disabilities. As story editor for documentary films she has worked with many directors and editors through the Sundance Institute. She teaches in the theatre department at Loyola Marymount University.

Catharine has acted in several productions for the Royal Shakespeare Company - performing at theaters in Stratford and at the Barbican in London, as well as playing leading roles in many repertory theaters throughout the UK.

She has served in the field of education in diverse roles: as an elementary teacher, principal, high school teacher, college administrator, adjunct instructor for Marymount College and the University of San Francisco. Sr. MaryAnne served the Diocese of Orange as an instructor for the Pastoral Ministry Institute and the deaconate program and as a member of the Commission for Ecumenical and Interfaith Affairs. Before coming to LMU, she was director of the Center for Spiritual Development in Orange.

As a professional artist and teacher at LMU she was producer/director for the Playwrights Center Stage new plays series; worked as producer, director and dramaturg with new play development programs sponsored by the National Endowment for the Arts, Playwrights Theatre, The Mark Taper Forum, Southern Repertory Theatre, Theatre Gallery in Los Angeles, of which she was founder and former artistic director. She has co-produced and directed a series of Oral Histories/Documentary Theatre projects with

seniors, cancer survivors, veterans, at risk youth, the unhoused, victims of domestic violence, survivors of trafficking, lifer parolees and other community-based groups.

Sr. Judith was a founding member of the Association for Theater in Higher Education (ATHE); former chair of that organization's Playwrights Program and New Plays production coordinator; past-chair for the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival's Region VIII Playwriting Program and member of that organization's governing board; recipient of the 2008 ATHE Outstanding Teacher of Theatre in Higher Education, a Kennedy Center Gold Medallion for contributions to new plays and playwrights and the 2012 Milan Stitt Award for her work as a playwriting mentor and teacher.

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KEITH STEVENSON (Video Producer) is the author of *The Fried Meat Trilogy*. The first play in the trilogy, *Out There on Fried Meat Ridge Rd*. (2012 Ovation nomination, Playwriting for an Original Play) played at Trafalgar Studios in London's West End with Keith performing. He is a resident artist at Pacific Resident Theatre and Rogue Machine Theatre. Keith and his partners at Small Films have presented shorts at film festivals around the world.



IN MEMORIAM



NESTOR PEREIRA joined LMU in June 1995 and as the manager of programming and facilities for Murphy Recital Hall, the university's premier music venue, he was vital to the educational training of our students in the Department of Music. Nestor was an essential team member in LMU College of Communication and Fine Arts and led the daily operations and maintenance of the hall, including scheduling, event logistics, and the management of student workers. He adeptly coordinated senior recitals, faculty performances, visiting soloists, chamber ensembles, and a range of public events.

Nestor's time on the bluff began as a student in 1973, after which he quickly embedded himself into the fabric of LMU Radio's KXLU 88.9FM. During his five decades with the radio station, he held various volunteer leadership positions, including program director, fine arts director, and on-air host of several music programs. Nestor's longest stint was as host of "The Early Evening Concert," a primarily classical mix, which he presented with passion.

His last show was June 5. Nestor passed away on June 24, 2023.
